Peter Raadsig's father, a ship captain, was lost at sea while on his way home from Holland when his son was only six months old. Some years later Peter Raadsig's mother married the bailiff of the mansion of Skjoldenæsholm, which is situated in a forested Zealand landscape a good 10 kilometres (6½ miles) northeast of Ringsted. In this beautiful and varied area, characterized by deep forests and clear lakes, the boy spent his early childhood, and as a grown artist he often returned there to paint. He is buried in Valsølille churchyard, not far from Skjoldenæsholm. The motif of the hunter and his hounds on a duck shoot is not Raadsig's first hunting picture. Even as a young pupil at the Academy, he exhibited a picture of a battue¹ at Charlottenborg, bought by the president of the Academy, the later King Christian VIII.

Among Peter Raadsig's last four works to be exhibited at Charlottenborg in 1881, two took their motifs from the area near Skjoldenæsholm. One of them, *Udsigt mod Hvalsølille sø ved Skjoldenæsholm* (*View toward Hvalsølille Lake near Skjoldenæsholm*), could very well be the atmospheric hunting scene in the Loeb collection.
